Why Print Images?

Why do we always have fewer printed images than digitally projected images in our club competitions? More than likely it is just easier and cheaper to submit projected images. I encourage you to take the next step and begin printing some of your images if you haven't done so yet. We create our images as an artistic means of sharing something about ourselves and our environment. I believe it is important to share what we do with others. Some would say it might even be a spiritual expression of our own soul. Yes, I know you are sharing digital images, but printed images are a different format with a lasting durability about them.

For purposes of club competition alone, I could see that it doesn't matter whether your images are digital or printed, unless of course you are one of those competitive people and you want to maximize your opportunity to achieve more points toward our year end competition. Hopefully, your goals reach far beyond club competition. Perhaps you want to enter a juried fine art show some day, exhibit your work in a gallery, or maybe even sell some work. In that case you will most likely need to print your images. I can share with you the joy I experience when I have seen someone look at one of my prints and you can see their enjoyment. I recently sold an image during a show at a gallery on Santa Fe and I was able to see how happy that image made the buyer feel. It is hard to describe. That is why I print my images. I want an expanded opportunity to share my work! That is why I take photos. They aren't just for me.

The club affords you this great opportunity to practice this craft of print making which in itself is a skill that requires some experience to master. Even if you rely solely on someone else to print your work, there are many different papers, etc. and image processing in your work flow that you need to consider. I encourage you to take advantage of the great opportunity you have at the club and start entering some prints in the competition. Take the next step if you aren't currently printing.

Earlier I did mention that cost might be a consideration in your decision to print. Don't let that stop you. We all pay fees for classes and workshops so just include the cost of printing as another cost to advance your photography. I also recommend that you visit a print maker such as Reed Art & Imaging. They will give you a personal tour of their facility and explain the printing process and products available. Very educational!

You don't need to own a printer, although some would promote the control you have when you print your own images. There are some affordable places to print that aren't going to require a second mortgage. Believe it or not Costco can be an option. They aren't the most consistent, but they can be a very affordable starting point. You can get your images the same day in some cases. I would also recommend a local printer who is a club member, Jerry Osborne of SOCO Imaging at http://socoimaging.businesscatalyst.com/. Jerry's page has great information to get you going and he is very willing to walk you through the process. I could go on and on listing all the print resources available, some Pro DPI online companies such as http://www.prodpi.com/ that even offer free shipping. In the very near future you will see a more expanded printing resource on our web site. If you have questions

Abstract - Images that concentrate on shape, form, color, pattern, texture, angles, and blur. The aim is to help the viewer gain an emotional attachment to the image or enjoying the 'feel' of how it looks.

People in Sports - Images with people participating, watching, and or officiating in a sporting activity these can be of action or features of the sport.

Human Interest - Images depict a person or persons in an interactive, emotional, or unusual situation, excluding recreational or sports action.

Our very own Brad McDowell will show off some of his favorite places to shoot in the park and why it's one of his favorite locations. Brad is an active member of the club with several awards and has a great portfolio showcasing a wide range of photographic interests. Rich in wildlife, Cherry Creek State Park is anchored around an 880 surface acre reservoir. The park offers a natural prairie environment of gentle, rolling hills and complete outdoor recreation facilities, including camping, picnicking and facilities for group events. Our plan is to shoot sunrise in the park- hopefully we will have some great clouds and reflections on the water. With an early spring shoot, there should be cracked ice on the water- adding impact and drama to our images. Later, Brad will help us with other ideas and places to go after sunrise.

groups with similar interests to tool around town together. Once more details from the event organizers are posted, I will update members on our plans.


Volunteers wanted!
